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Session Formats

All of this year's conference sessions will be held **virtually and synchronously**. Presentation formats include:

Results Presentation (30 minutes – 20 minutes presentation, 10 minutes Q&A) -

Results presentations give attendees the opportunity to learn about a presenter's fully developed and implemented educational practice. Priority will be given to proposals focused on one or more of the conference themes.

Work-in-Progress Presentation (15 minutes - 10 minutes presentation, 10 minutes Q&A) - This lightning round presentation format gives attendees the opportunity to be inspired by your educational innovation or idea in development. We will group multiple presenters, ideally with related work, into shared conference sessions.

Priority will be given to presentations focused on one or more of the conference subthemes.

Panel (45 minutes, including at least 15 minutes discussion with audience) - Panel discussions are appropriate for topics that benefit from multiple perspectives. The goal for panel discussions is to provide panelists and audience members the opportunity to exchange insights, engage in discussion, and learn from each other's experiences. The panel leader should submit the proposal and identify 3-4 panelists.

Poster (asynchronous virtual via conference site with a synchronous Q&A session) - A poster gives attendees the opportunity to explore a colleague's work in a concise format. Posters may be accompanied by audio, video, or other artifacts that may deepen attendees' understanding or be made available for others to use. Posters must be created using a provided template to standardize accessibility. Presenters must be available online for the synchronous Q&A session.

EVIDENCE (if relevant). As applicable, the data/evidence you have collected, and your processes for collecting and analyzing that data/evidence.

INSIGHTS / LESSONS LEARNED. Provide some information about the impacts you have observed as well as what you have learned through the experience.

Engaging with AI in Teaching and Learning

In times marked by rapid technological advancement, the integration of generative artificial Intelligence (AI) into educational contexts represents a frontier of both opportunities and challenges. This theme aims to explore how educators and learners can collaboratively navigate and leverage AI technologies to support teaching and learning. It invites proposals on how AI tools can enhance teaching effectiveness, personalize learning experiences, and equip learners with the skills needed for a future intertwined with AI.

Supporting Global Mobility for All Students

This theme delves into the concept of fostering global connectedness among the Northeastern community. The aim is to share insights and practices that empower students to thrive in an interconnected world, fully engaging with the rich constellation of global experiences offered by Northeastern's expansive global campus network. It aligns with the university's vision of utilizing global mobility as a pivotal component of experiential learning. We invite proposals that showcase innovative approaches to global education and advising, case studies of successful mobility programs and projects, strategies for fostering cross-cultural awareness, skills and mindsets, approaches to ensure inclusivity and accessibility, and research on the impact of global learning experiences on student development.

Activating Hands on, Minds on Experiential Learning

This theme centers on the transformative power of experiential learning, emphasizing the synergy between real-world experiences and intellectual growth. The aim is to explore the different forms of experiential learning at Northeastern that integrate authentic or applied engagement outside the classroom with academic courses. Examples may include XN, ServiceLearning, or other projects or experiences leveraging real-world data, artifacts, audiences, or contexts.
