Session Content and Format

All of this year's conference sessions will be held **virtually**. Presentation formats include:

- **Results Presentation – 30 minutes (20 minutes presentation, 10 minutes Q&A)** - Results presentations give attendees the opportunity to learn about a presenter's fully developed and implemented educational practice or research with results.
- **Work-in-Progress Presentation – 30 minutes (20 minutes presentation, 10 minutes Q&A)** - This presentation format gives attendees the opportunity to be inspired by an educational innovation, idea, or research in development.
- **Panel – 45 minutes**
 - **(including at least 15 minutes discussion with audience)** - Panel discussions are appropriate for topics that benefit from multiple perspectives. The goal for panel discussions is to provide panelists and audience members the opportunity to exchange insights, engage in discussion, and learn from each other's experiences. The panel leader should submit the proposal and identify NO MORE THAN 3-4 panelists.
- **Poster (asynchronous digital poster including a 5-minute video)** - A poster provides attendees the opportunity to explore a colleague's work asynchronously. Each poster will be accompanied by a short video in which the presenter gives an overview of their work. This video, along with the poster, will be hosted on the conference site for attendees to view at any time. Presenters must use the provided poster template and

video guidelines to ensure accessibility and standardization, and they must also follow the provided guidelines for creating their video. Participants and presenters will have the opportunity to interact on the site, through written messages and comments.

CAEBL 2026 invites Northeastern faculty, staff and students across all disciplines to return to the fundamental question of why learning matters and why we teach. As AI reshapes education, we face the challenge of pivoting and adjusting while maintaining balance amid chaos, rethinking everything from student and faculty roles in learning to how we assess student work. Yet within this disruption lies an opportunity: to focus on designing experiences that foster engagement and transfer, develop critical thinking skills and creative problem solving, and prepare students for an unknown future. This conference explores how we can partner thoughtfully with AI while keeping human connection at the center—engaging students both with and without technology, motivating genuine learning, and navigating uncertainty together.
